It is sad to hear the resignation of our president and I'm glad to know that another brother is willing to assume the position to continue the future of San Diego 45. You have my "sincere" support.

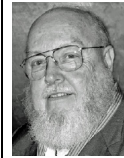
My wife and I will be out of the country for a couple of weeks starting on the 16th of this month. I hope to see you all next stated meeting.

### THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER

Do you recall hearing the fourth stanza of our National Anthem. I think the majority of the time I've heard it, only the first stanza was sung. I'm sure that many of our citizens believe that's all there is.

Recently, at the beginning of a special program on TV, all four stanzas were performed. I was amazed, I think it was the first time I had ever heard them all.

If you Goggle "Star Spangled Banner Lyrics" you'll get only the first commonly heard stanza. Here is all four stanzas:

*O say can you see, by the dawn's early light,  
What so proudly we hailed at the twilight's last gleaming,  
Whose broad stripes and bright stars through the perilous fight,  
O'er the ramparts we watched, were so gallantly streaming?  
And the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air,  
Gave proof through the night that our flag was still there;*

*O say does that star-spangled banner yet wave  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?*

*On the shore dimly seen through the mists of the deep,  
Where the foe's haughty host in dread silence reposes,  
What is that which the breeze, o'er the towering steep,  
As it fitfully blows, half conceals, half discloses?  
Now it catches the gleam of the morning's first beam,  
In full glory reflected now shines in the stream:  
'Tis the star-spangled banner, O long may it wave  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.*

*And where is that band who so vauntingly swore  
That the havoc of war and the battle's confusion,  
A home and a country, should leave us no more?  
Their blood has washed out their foul footsteps' pollution.  
No refuge could save the hireling and slave  
From the terror of flight, or the gloom of the grave:  
And the star-spangled banner in triumph doth wave,  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.*

*O thus be it ever, when freemen shall stand  
Between their loved homes and the war's desolation.  
Blest with vict'ry and peace, may the Heav'n rescued land  
Praise the Power that hath made and preserved us a nation!  
Then conquer we must, when our cause it is just,  
And this be our motto: 'In God is our trust.'  
And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!*

Wow! What a difference.

On 7 September, 1814, Frances Scott Key and John Stuart Skinner approached the British Fleet, attacking Baltimore, under a flag of truce to seek the exchange of prisoners. Together they spoke with Major General Robert Ross and Vice Admiral Alexander Cochrane over dinner while the two officers discussed war plans. Because they overheard those plans they were detained overnight aboard the British flagship HMS Tonnant and then on other British ships until the British attack was repulsed.

Key observed the bombardment of Fort McHenry during the night of 13 September and was inspired by the American victory and the sight of the large American flag flying triumphantly above the fort the next morning. Aboard the ship, Key wrote a poem on the back of a letter he had kept in his pocket. At twilight on September 16, he and Skinner were released in Baltimore. He completed the poem at the Indian Queen Hotel, where he was staying, and titled it "Defense of Fort M'Henry".

The first broadside printing of the poem occurred on 17 September, 1814 and On September 20, both the Baltimore Patriot and The American printed the song, with the note "Tune: Anacreon in Heaven" by English composer John Stafford Smith. The song

quickly became popular, with seventeen newspapers from Georgia to New Hampshire printing it. Soon after, Thomas Carr of the Carr Music Store in Baltimore published the words and music together under the title "The Star Spangled Banner", although it was originally called "Defense of Fort M'Henry". The song's popularity increased, and its first public performance took place in October 1814.

Until 1931, other songs served as the hymns of American officialdom. "Hail, Columbia" served this purpose at official functions for most of the 19th century. "My Country, 'Tis of Thee," whose melody is identical to "God Save the Queen," the British national anthem, also served as a de facto anthem. Following the War of 1812 and subsequent American wars, other songs emerged to compete for popularity at public events, among them "The Star-Spangled Banner," as well as "America the Beautiful."

"The Star-Spangled Banner" was recognized for official use by the United States Navy in 1889, and by U.S. President Woodrow Wilson in 1916, and was made the national anthem by a congressional resolution on March 3, 1931 (46 Stat. 1508, codified at 36 U.S.C. § 301), which was signed by President Herbert Hoover.
